



ABOUT THE ILLUSTRATOR

Artist Robert Castillo was born in New York but raised in the Dominican Republic, the oldest of six boys. It was there, at the age of five, that Robert would draw monsters and aliens in his uncle's college books. When he returned to the United States a few years later, he did not speak any English, so he drew to communicate with elementary school classmates. By nine, Robert had won the Scholastic Achievement Award for Art. Much later, Robert attended the Art Institute of Boston, where he won Illustrator of the Year. In 2004, as a student at New York's School of Visual Arts (SVA), he produced "S.P.I.C. The Storyboard of My Life," chronicling his difficult transition years. The film has since won awards at twelve festivals and has screened at the Cannes Film Festival.

Today, Robert works as a storyboard artist for The Sopranos, MTV and various music videos and movies. An adjunct professor in William Patterson University's Animation Program, Robert has lectured at New York University, SVA and teaches storyboarding to high-school students at Automotive High School in Brooklyn.

ABOUT THE ILLUSTRATOR

Gustavo Bollinger was born and still resides in Cordoba, Argentina, where he has been drawing ever since he can remember. After finishing high school, Gustavo took a couple of drawing and painting workshops, studied industrial design for one year, and then took classes at the National University of Cordoba in fine arts for another year and a half. Despite the classes, Gustavo says he has tried to be as "self taught" as possible by researching his own means. He is currently in his last year of studying multimedia design. The highlight of all his arts studies so far has been assisting fellow Argentine and famed science fiction illustrator Oscar Chichoni at a workshop. Other artists whom Gustavo says have inspired him in life include Frank Frazetta, Norman Rockwell, Sebastian Kruger, Yanick Dusseault and Travis Charest. Gustavo's dream is to be able to work in any kind of creative arena, including book covers, movies, video games and concept art.

ABOUT THE ILLUSTRATOR

Alexandra Szweryn terms herself a traditional artist, based in Brisbane, who grew up on Australia's Gold Coast in a Polish immigrant family. From an early age, Alexandra says she was influenced by classic European children's book illustrations. It wasn't until her high-school years that she discovered the complex stories and intricate illustrations found in Japanese manga comics. Having grown fond of them, Alexandra began her journey of teaching herself the basics of art illustration as well as the application of inks, watercolors and other traditional media.

In 2005, Alexandra was accepted into Qantm College to study for a diploma in screen animation under a full scholarship. There, she learned storyboarding, which eventually led her to create original comics and illustrations. Of her art passion, Alexandra says that "fables have a life of their own, just like everyday people . . . they breathe, they feel, and yearn to be heard . . . it is because of this reason that I strive to bring life to my illustrations."



ABOUT THE ILLUSTRATOR

Stephen Stanley lives on five forested Oregon acres with a mermaid and other wild critters—some are welcome, others are not. As a teenager in the late 1960s, Stephen contributed stories and drawings to comics fandom, but after earning a BFA from the Kansas City Art Institute in 1973 he left his hometown to become a graphic designer. He has designed annual reports for major San Francisco-based corporations, consumer and trade magazines, and marketing material for a west coast distributor of eco-friendly products.

After an extended professional break, Stephen resumed writing and illustrating when he moved to Eugene, Oregon in 1993. Since 1994, Stephen has been a member of the writer's group The Wordos. He first entered the Illustrators of the Future Contest in 1994, but then took a hiatus to hone his writing craft. In 2001, he started entering both contests (almost) every quarter. With his winning illustrations, Stephen has become the first entrant to win both Writers of the Future ("Mars Hath No Fury like a Pixel Double-Crossed" in XXI) and Illustrators of the Future Contests. He is contemplating his next move.


The Bird Reader's Granddaughter
