## Chapter 3 <br> The Numbers

Many of you already know the números in Spanish up to ten, but do you know them out of sequence? If you can't remember that eight is ocho without counting up to it, put a cue card with the números en español on your teléfono both at the oficina and at your casa. Every time you dial a número, on the teléfono, look at your Spanish cue card and say the number you are dialing en español. When you've mastered the numbers to ten, change your cue card and go by tens to one hundred. If you try this technique, you're on your way to mastering a very importante set of vocabulario!

## Days of the Week and Months of the Year

When you schedule an appointment or want to find out when a store or other establishment is open, you will need to know the days of the week and the months of the year. This is such a practical list of words, especially when you pair them with the numbers you just learned. Here's an important tip: In Spanish a date is always given in a standard format. Begin by saying the day of the week, like Monday or lunes for example. The word "eP' or "the" comes next, and that is followed by the date. The month always comes last. Tuesday the $11^{\text {th }}$ of October is martes, el once de octubre. To practice dates, say all the birthdays of the members of your family.
