
Alert Annie the ant felt a small quake, as the walls and the ceiling started to shake.




"Hello big shoes, how are you today? Please be careful as you move on your way."



Then the walls of the hall came crashing down, as the scared ants ran all around.




The giant shoes stomped again and again.
Two loud voices boomed, "stomp eight, nine and ten!"




Above army ants soared in the sky, even though army ants can't fly.



Below ants were starting to cry, looking up at the ceiling and wondering why.




And some were trapped, all alone.

The table was set, and the iPads put away, as mama and papa shared stories from the day.




"Thud. Thud.

"Oh, sweetheart, it was just a bad dream.


They followed us home? What does he mean?"

From that day, they were careful and kind to their little friends. And did all that they could do to make amends.




They took the time to learn from each other, and found there was a lot to discover.


A terrible start, and a happy end. The boy and girl earned their friends.











### THE QUEEN

Loving parents who help their children discover the importance of caring for all creatures.


# Parent's Cheat Sheet

Reading to Children Four and Under

- You're on the clock! Most children at this age will stay engaged for 10 to 15 minutes. The older, the longer usually.
- **Prepare yourself.** Read or skim the book beforehand. The adult reader will probably need to summarize the page to keep interest.
- **Pictures are worth a thousand words.** Make sure the child can see the pictures. Sitting the child on the side with the picture (as opposed to the text) is a good idea.
- 4 Lights, camera, action! Read each character's spoken lines in character.

  Make sure to use intonation and inflection.
- Encourage participation. Read aloud the title, sentences and onomatopoeia (e.g. smash, splash, crash, whoosh and other words that represent noises). Have the child repeat sentences and key phrases according to their level. Keep your finger under each word you read to encourage reading recognition.
- Ask questions! Kids are smart! Really smart! Their listening comprehension is much higher than their speaking skills. See the activities section for ideas and recommended questions. For this age group, questions with a definite answer work best. "Is he happy? How many mountains are there?"






# Parent's Cheat Sheet


#### Reading to Children Four and Over

- You're on the clock! Older children will usually have longer attention spans (20-30 minutes), but there is usually a limit. Get to know how much time you have.
- **Prepare yourself.** Read or skim the book beforehand. The adult reader might need to summarize the page to keep interest. When reading to advanced learners, the adult should be aware of the difficulty level of words and sentences. This way the advanced learner can try to read the easier words and sentences according to their level. Two popular techniques are as follows:
  - 1) Alternate reading sentences aloud with the adult reading the more difficult sentences.
  - 2) Have the child read one or all of the character's lines in quotes.
- **Reinforce reading.** Make sure the child can see the words. Keep your finger under each word you read to encourage reading recognition.
- Lights, camera, action! Read each character's spoken lines in character. Make sure to use intonation and inflection. A popular technique is to allow the child to read the characters' lines, as the language is usually at a lower difficulty level.
- **Encourage participation.** Read aloud the title, sentences and onomatopoeia (e.g. smash, splash, crash, whoosh and other words that represent noises). Have the child read sentences and key phrases according to their level. Keep your finger under each word you read to encourage reading recognition (if needed).
- Ask questions, and have kids ask you questions! Kids are smart! Really smart! Their listening comprehension is much higher than their speaking skills. See the activities section for ideas and recommended questions. For this age group, in addition to questions with a definite answers, try open-ended questions. "Why is he happy? What will happen next?"
- Your turn to listen. At a certain stage, the child will be able to read to you. Have them keep their finger under each word they read and sound out (if needed), and correctly pronounce it after they read it.



# **Activities**

In this section, we'll show some of the possibilities on one page. Each illustration provides a chance to interact with the child.



#### Easy Questions — usually with a definite answer

- How many ants are there?
- What are the ants doing? (Basically, digging!)
- Where is the moon? Is the moon awake?
- How many stars are there?
- What color is the sky?

#### More Difficult Questions — usually open-ended

- What are the ants doing? (Name as many different activites
- as possible)
- How long will it take them?
- Where do the ants put the old dirt? (Ants dump dirt outside, which is what makes the hill shape)
- Why are the ants doing that?

#### Have the Child Ask You a Question:

Example: Ask me a question about the ants.

#### Some suggestions:

- What kind of ants are they?
- Who is working the hardest?
- Who has dug the deepest?
- When will the ants finish work?
- How do the ants see in the dark?
- Why do the ants live underground?

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
